- Provide support, fellowship, and worthwhile activities to the student body


BACKGROUND

Membership

- 20 members at the start of the school year
- Presence on campus very limited
- Interest in CPFI was low
- CPFI activities had not been advertised well and were held on inconsistent dates

Student Needs

- There were no other student groups which existed solely to support the student body
- Students were often reluctant to join organizations for fear of feeling obligated to sign up for activities





METHODS

- Create a chapter vision: They will know us by our love
- Offer activities and meetings where students felt there were no strings attached
- Implement free weekly homemade breakfasts which include a short devotional and prayer
- Encourage members to conduct the weekly devotional
- Offer a Digging Deeper series with professors, a dinner and game night, a worship night, and professional development meetings
- Partner with a local church organization to send members to Honduras on a medical mission trip

RESULTS

- Membership increased from 20 to 71 members (355% increase)
- Students felt supported in a judgement-free environment and built lasting friendships across all pharmacy class years
- The presence of the organization was greatly increased across the USF Health campus
- Non-Christians felt welcome and often attended our events and meetings
- 4 members of our chapter will be attending the medical mission trip in July 2019




Figure 1. Official Growth in CPFI

Background

Veteran's Restoration Quarters

The mission is to create a principle-based environment and comprehensive residential program that addresses every area of restoration in the life of a homeless veteran.

Saturday Sanctuary at First Presbyterian Church in Asheville, NC

A downtown church shares the boundary breaking love of Christ. From December to March the church opens on Saturdays to offer a warm facility, serve a healthy lunch, and provide fun activities. The goal is to create a safe place to interact with the homeless.

Geraldine's Soup Kitchen

The Open Door Christian Center offers a 90-day residential recovery program for those with addictions and desire a change. Residents live on campus, attend recovery group meetings daily, participate in worship services in Hope Chapel, and assist in the soup kitchen that serves meals to people who are homeless or hungry. The recovery program reinforces structure, work ethic, responsibility, and devotion to God, family and community.

Objectives

- To live out and practice Matthew 25:34-40
- To volunteer our time and resources to help others in need
- To learn how other facilities organize their volunteers
- To bring back knowledge from Asheville, NC to Clinton, SC
- To create a network within the Clinton community
- To foster leadership in student members
- To encourage teamwork within the chapter

Methods

Veteran's Restoration Quarters

We prepared food for lunch and dinner. At noon, we served lunch to the residents and hung out and interacted with several of the residents remaining in the dining area.






Saturday Sanctuary

We contributed canned foods and held fundraisers to help support the organization. We also volunteered our time to help serve food and interact with residents.









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Hot Dog Ministry

BACKGROUND

In 2008, a group of local students from the College of Charleston saw a need in our community. They began serving hot dogs to anyone a few nights a week under the I-26/Arthur Ravenel Bridge overpass. Word spread about the work of these college students and the local churches quickly became involved, and the ministry continues to increase. Now, more than 7 local churches regularly serve dinner to the homeless community every single night.

OBJECTIVES

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in."

Matthew 25:35

"If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed, but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? James 2:16

"My command is this: love each other as I have loved you." John 15:12

Our mission is to show God's love and to spread the Gospel to the Charleston community by providing daily meals for those in need.

METHODS

MUSC's CPFI student chapter became involved with the Hot Dog Ministry when one of our professors, Dr. Wayne Weart, felt called to serve with it more than 8 years ago. He established cochair positions in our organization designated to work with the Hot Dog Ministry. Our co-chairs of this ministry serve weekly alongside other churches to serve the meal.

Once a semester, our chapter provides the food and the volunteers to serve between 70-100 people. In our fall "Hot Dog Ministry Takeover" night, we served chicken bog, green beans, baked beans, bread and an assortment of desserts. With the donation from the Hands and Feet Grant, we were able to provide enough food for everyone in attendance as well as a togo box for each person.

At our fall "takeover" night, we also passed out the donations that had been collected from our school-wide clothing drive. We collected hundreds of shirts and long pants for men. We gave away hundreds of hygiene products including soap, shampoo, toothbrushes, tooth paste, and deodorant. Because we had heard people inquire about new socks while working with the Hot Dog Ministry throughout the semester, we emphasized this in our clothing drive and were able to provide everyone with multiple pairs of new socks.

RESULTS

Each night, a devotion is given, the meal is provided, thanks are expressed through prayer and the Gospel is presented. Daily, people are given the opportunity to accept Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and because of this,"...there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents." Luke 15:10

CONCLUSION

"Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25:40

Because of this ministry, our chapter has grown in our own relationships with Christ and has learned to love the people of the Charleston community.

FUTURE PLANS

Our executive board has decided for next year to encourage weekly involvement from our general membership. Whereas we now have two members serving weekly and the entire chapter serving twice a year, we would like to increase our weekly participation number.







Background

Who we are

We serve as ambassadors of Christ, and promote the good news on our campus through various activities. These activities include: outreach events, Bible studies, praise events, and Bible games.



Our Pajama Drive

CPFI at the University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB) regularly partners with Casey Cares, an organization that serves thousands of families with critically ill children who have extended stays at the hospital in the mid-Atlantic region by donating pajamas and other comfort items to these families. This year, CPFI at UMB utilized the Hands and Feet grant to purchase pajamas, gift cards and scripture cards for these children and their families through Casey Cares. These gifts were geared towards spreading Christ's joy during the Christmas season to these families. With the award of the Hands and Feet grant, we were able to exemplify the Hands and Feet of Jesus and provide some comfort to critically ill children and their families, while also sharing the love of Christ in the Baltimore area during the festive season.

Objectives

- Provide pajamas for critically ill, hospitalized and/or homebound children.
- Provide gift cards to the families in order to relief some of their financial burden.
- Share the love of Christ through inspirational Bible scriptures.

Methods


Purchases

- Pack of coloring markers

- 10 Psalms coloring cards
- 6 visa gift cards:
 - 5 gift cards were loaded with \$30.00 each
 - 1 was loaded with \$25.00
 - Fees charged for loading the cards were \$31.90

On December 21, 2018 four members from the University of Maryland CPFI made a final donation to Casey Cares Foundation. The donations included a total of 20 pajamas, 6 visa gift cards, scripture cards and coloring markers. These donations would be able to serve about 30 - 40 children.

Objective

- To share the Lord's love to the community by providing Bibles that include encouraging notes.

Background

Our Inspiration:

- The families at the Agape free medical clinic that seek our help with any medical problem that they may have.
- The kindness and appreciation of these families inspired us to present Bibles to them to spread the Lord's love and kindness anywhere they go.
- "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another" -Proverbs 27:17

Our Goals:

- Share the Lord's love to the community by providing continued growth in community outreach and service
- Provide patients at Agape with ample opportunities to grow in faith
- Provide more service opportunities for members to give back to the Weatherford community
- Help families grow closer to God, encouraging them to let their own lights shine.

Our Future

- Share our experiences as a student chapter to potentially help other members grow in their own faith
- Serve as witnesses for Christ with every opportunity we have
- Create a positive environment to the community, encouraging people to shine their light everyday

Methods

Organizational Fellowship:

- <u>Weekly morning devotionals</u> Each Wednesday, members gathered together for breakfast and officer-led devotionals. Students prayed for their faculty and fellow students, read scripture, and shared what the Lord had placed on their hearts.
- Prayer PartnersPrayer partners was implemented as a new way for students to grow closer spiritually. Members were assigned a new partner to pray for and grow alongside on a biweekly basis.


BIBLE PROJECT

- We placed boxes in our student lounge, reaching out to the entire College of Pharmacy to help with Bible donations.
- We asked each member of the group to "sponsor" a Bible by leaving notes of encouragement and highlighting verses that inspire us.
- We met as a group to mark in the Bibles, as well as pray over them before handing them out at the Agape clinic.

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Results

Mission:

 These activities provided members with an opportunity to personally grow in their faith as they give back to their community and the profession of pharmacy, as well as encourage the community to grow in faith.

Community Outreach (Service): 2018-2019 data

- Little Dresses for Africa: >120 dresses produced and donated
- Operation Christmas Child: 40 boxes were prepared and donated
- Agape Medical Clinic: >100 hours volunteered annually
- FCP Bible drive: Members collected over 100 Bibles combined from the community.

Financial:

- We were fortunate to receive the Hands and Feet Grant of \$500
- We were able to buy approximately 340 new English and Spanish adult and children's Bibles
- Presentation to SWOSU™ Student Government Association
 - Grant of \$1,000 for the 2018-2019 academic year
- Application to Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation
 - Grant of \$120/student to attend CPFI Annual Meeting



Conclusion

The SWOSU™ chapter exists to unite pharmacy students who have a desire to grow closer to Christ, as well as one another, through service, fellowship, and commitment to the Gospel. We aim to share the Good News as we incorporate the love of Christ into all aspects of our life, placing an emphasis on our professional lives as pharmacists. Our student chapter has successfully helped families spread love to the community by spreading their lights and providing encouraging words to those they came into contact with.


