# Christ as Our Example: Servanthood

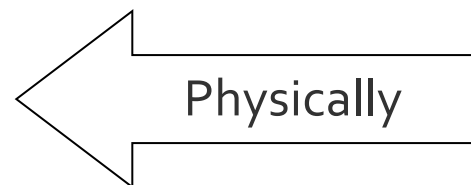
## Served His Father

## Physically

- Provide humanitarian aid, food, medical care, etc.

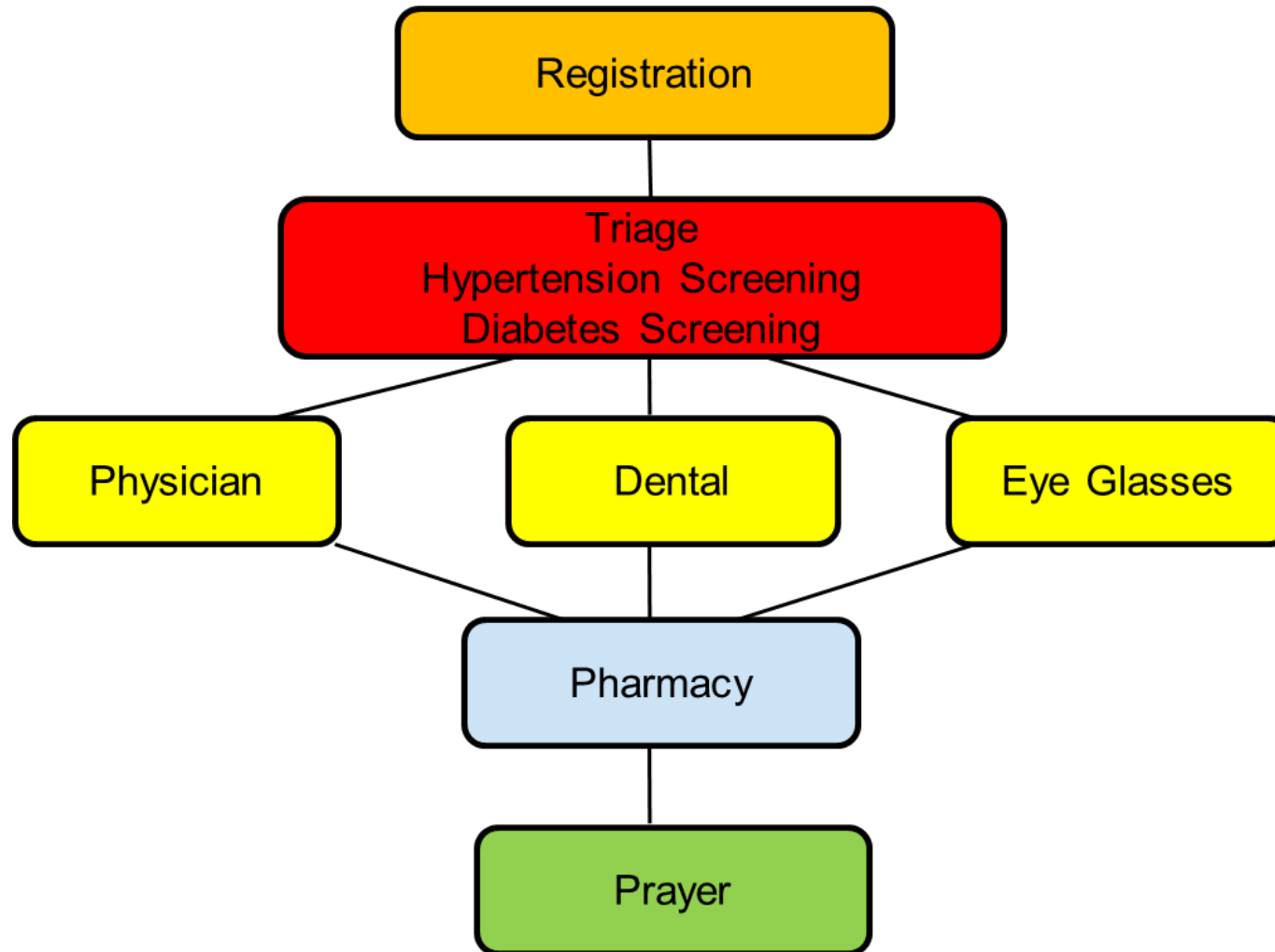
# Types of Missions Settings

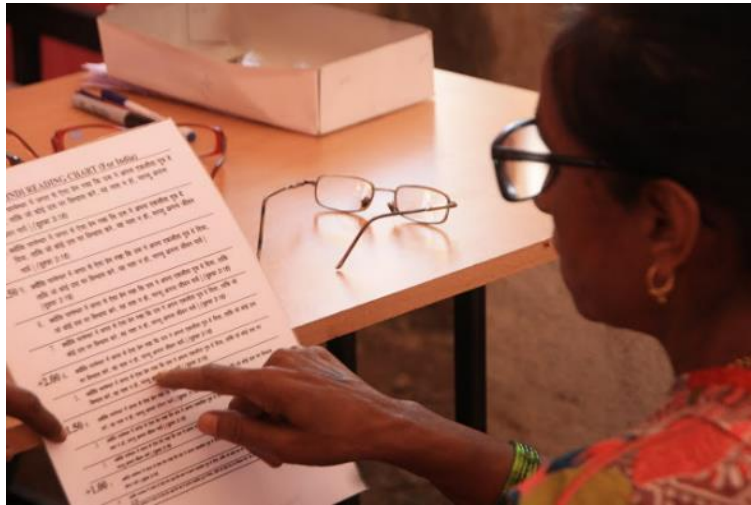
