PURPOSE


- James 1:27 says, "Pure and genuine religion in the sight of God the Father means caring for orphans and widows in their distress and refusing to let the world corrupt you."

METHODS

- FCP began establishing contact with a variety of local ministries to assess areas of need and options to collaborate to meet both physical and mental needs of individuals and families within our community.
- Communication with the Weatherford Ministerial Alliance allowed for connection with local widows and widowers. FCP members partnered with the SWOSU freshmen orientation course to identify and meet tangible needs.

Services, Circle of Care, local restaurants, and We Rock The Spectrum (WRTS) indoor playground allowed for identification of family specific needs, advertisement of services, and hands and feet to provide the services.

Widows and widowers received the gift of food, fellowship, and physical needs being met around the house.

Seven families participated in a Parent's Night Out where over 25 children enjoyed dinner and an evening of fun at WRTS with FCP and PLS supervision.
