Dear Editor,

I read the article, "Emergency Contraception: Available Over-the-Counter?" in your July/Aug, 2003, newsletter. You stated in the article that Plan B (levonorgestrel) "prevents" pregnancy 89 percent of the time and that Preven "prevents" pregnancy at least 75 percent of the time. The correct term is not "prevents", but should be "aborts" pregnancy. You specifically stated elsewhere that these agents prevent implantation of an embryo. Thus, these agents abort pregnancies, not prevent them. Even Christians can be mislead by the use of improper terminology.

Haitian Medical Mission Task Force Seeks Pharmacist for Spring Missions Trip

The spring of 2004 is the next missions trip on the schedule of the Haiti Medical Mission Task Force. This organization needs a pharmacist to join its missions expeditions to Haiti, which are undertaken several times a year. The team already includes physicians, nurses, engineers, teachers, administrators, students, pastoral care, and even good hand holders. The team has not included a pharmacist in the past, but is seeking one, according to Cynthia Calhoun, secretary for the Mission Task Force. The team went this past fall,

and is looking forward to the spring trip.

"Locally, we are trying to collect 50 white, twin bed sheet sets and 100 poly cotton towels for Hospital Ste. Croix in Leogane, a 120-bed hospital just south of Port-au-Prince. The conditions there are dire," explains Cynthia. Monetary donations would be greatly appreciated. Also, Cynthia suggests that if you live near a Bed, Bath and Beyond store, you might want to purchase and send gift certificates that the Task Force can use to buy linens for the mission effort. the first time in my life, other than as a baby, that I have been this thin. I used to weigh over 333 pounds, and I have lost 200. It wasn't easy, nor was it painless. But I have suffered with obesity and morbid obesity most of my life. With God on my side, and the help of my husband of 18 years, I was able to lose weight. I have dieted, exercised, and had two surgeries to help accomplish my weight loss. Since my first surgery in 1996 to lose weight, I had to change the mental image I had of myself. I still saw myself as a very large person who had trouble sitting under a booth at a restaurant. My eating habits had to change also. I still like most of the same foods, but now I know and understand my limits.

I believe God has given me a heart for people who are overweight because I can relate and understand the feelings that being overweight bring. My weight loss began when the Lord showed me how to start focusing on others rather than myself. I began to pray for those I knew who were struggling with their weight and trying to lose. Now, I want to encourage those who have tried to lose weight but have failed.
